

Pacific Coast Producers 2021 CROP REPORT

Conventionals - Harvest continues however, we are not as far along in tonnage as we typically would be for this time of year. It is taking fields a little longer to ripen despite high day time temperatures. We anticipate harvest to pick up in the coming weeks as more fields ripen and are ready for harvest.

San Marzano Style – Harvest completed last Friday in a somewhat disappointing fashion. Although our quality of plum tomatoes was quite good and yield per tons delivered was exceptional, our crop came in at 55% of desired. Products that use this tomato will be limited on availability due to this unforeseen outcome.



Organics – Harvest and production completed at the Woodland canning facility at 6am on Monday, June 26th. In review, our organic tomato crop picked out at 73% of expectations with a disappointing yield that affected our peeling percentage and total cases produced this summer.



Organics – Harvest continues and is going well. All normal cultural practices continue in all orchards.

Conventionals – Harvest continues and we are approaching the peak of season. Late varieties are experiencing sporadic ripening; some fruit is very green and other blocks are ripe and ready for harvest. Fruit quality continues to look good. Fruit size and labor continue to be an issue for growers in the North. Weather temperatures remain below average due to the overcast of smoke from the Dixie Fire which will hinder fruit growth and overall sizing.
